### 4. RANGE OF OCCUPATIONS ACCESSIBLE TO THE HOLDER OF THE CERTIFICATE

A Maritime officer small ships can work aboard vessels less than 3000GT in size and up to 3000kW in power. These ships can be used in property and dry bulk transport, (heavy) cargo transport, reefer transport, towing or passenger transport. He can also work on any contractor vessel. These ships are within a range of 200 sea miles from a notable working port and are generally active in nautical contracting (such as dredging and coastal/bank engineering), coastal towing and offshore supplying of sea mine facilities and windmill parks.

The Maritime officer small ships is a generalist who can carry out nautical, loading and technical tasks. He is best-placed on vessels with an integrated company policy, where several processes are shore-supported. He is a ship officer who can be deployed for various tasks.

Because of (inter)national legislation, the Maritime officer small ships is required to possess a navigation licence, as set up by the International Convention on Standards of Training, Certification and Watchkeeping for Seafarers (STCW). Navigation licences are issued on the combination length/pulsation of ships and sailing areas.

The Maritime officer small ships must also be able to pass a maritime medical examination.

### 6. OFFICIALLY RECOGNISED WAYS OF ACQUIRING THE CERTIFICATE

Senior secondary vocational education features two learning pathways: the school-based pathway (bol) and the training on the job pathway (bbl).

In the school-based pathway, the majority of the course consists of theory at school. The extent of the practical component (vocational practice) is between 20% and 60%. In the training on the job pathway, the extent of vocational practice is at least 60% of the course. The participant works four days a week in a training company, and attends school for theory subjects just one day a week.

In principle it is possible to follow both learning pathways, but which pathway is offered will depend on the individual educational institution.
