<p>A Media editorial worker can work at various types of organisations, such as a publishing house, magazine, broadcast, printing office, multimedia company, publicity agency or design studio, but also at an internet, marketing or communications department of a profit, non-profit or governmental organisation. He works as a paid employee, but can also work freelance.</p>

<p><b>Access to next level of education/professions</b>  A Media editorial worker can develop to become a journalist, editor, reporter or editor-in-chief, among others. He can specialise through the higher professional educations Journalism or Information &amp; technology. Furthermore, he can also develop in the design and audio-visual technology.  He can also specialise at a certain medium, such as internet, television and/or radio or print. He can also expand to the creation of content for multiple (online) forms or media and/or focus on a combination of specialisations, such as radio &amp; television, or print and/or online.  The Media editorial worker can also develop in creating articles and items on various domains of knowledge, or specialise at a certain subject, theme or special interest, such as (local) politics, sports, fashion or music.</p>	<p><b>International agreements</b>  Media editorial worker is not a regulated profession in the Netherlands. However, the education and training for this profession on qualification level 4 is regulated under the European directive 2005/36/EC, amended by directive 2013/55/EU. The regulated education and training gives access to regulated professions at the level of a diploma according to article 11 of this directive.</p>

## 6. OFFICIALLY RECOGNISED WAYS OF ACQUIRING THE CERTIFICATE

<p>Senior secondary vocational education features two learning pathways: the school-based pathway (bol) and the training on the job pathway (bbl).  In the school-based pathway, the majority of the course consists of theory at school. The extent of the practical component (vocational practice) is between 20% and 60%. In the training on the job pathway, the extent of vocational practice is at least 60% of the course. The participant works four days a week in a training company, and attends school for theory subjects just one day a week.  In principle it is possible to follow both learning pathways, but which pathway is offered will depend on the individual educational institution.</p>	
<p><b>Average duration of the education/ training leading to the certificate</b></p>	<p><b>3 years (4800 study hours) (depending on previous education)</b></p>
<p><b>Entry requirements</b>  The certificate preparatory vocational secondary education (vmbo) advanced vocational programme, combined programme, or theoretical programme, or a comparable level.</p>

<p>Dutch senior secondary VET is based on qualification files, that each contain one or more qualifications. The information included in part 3 and 4 is derived directly from the qualification file determined by the Minister of Education, Culture and Science. The optional subjects have a total size of 15% of the course duration. The optional subjects completed by the student are listed on the certificate.</p>
