4. RANGE OF OCCUPATIONS ACCESSIBLE TO THE HOLDER OF THE CERTIFICATE

Computer game development takes place at various companies in the ICT and game sector. These sectors are oriented internationally as well as nationally.

A Computer game developer works within the computer game sector within the creative sector. A Computer game developer always works within a creative team (which may consist of a computer game artist, a media designer and a desktop publisher among others).

Access to next level of education/professions There are ways to develop through an ICT or media technology education within higher professional education: Business computer science, Computer science, Technical computer science, Information service and management, Multimedia design, Digital communication or Computer game development. In the media sector there is also a Management education in higher profession education. Through experience and additional training/education a Computer game developer can develop to become a senior computer game developer. Development to a supervising position is also possible, such as project manager or team leader. This requires supplemental qualities in communication and management.	International agreements The profession of Computer games developer is not regulated in the Netherlands. However the education and training for this profession on qualification level 4 is regulated under the European directive 2005/36/EC, amended by directive 2013/55/EU. The regulated education and training gives access to regulated professions at the level of a diploma according to article 11 of this directive.
Legal basis Act on Vocational Education and Training (WEB), registered number of qualification (crebo): 25188 The education and training for this qualification is offered as of August 1, 2015.	

6. OFFICIALLY RECOGNISED WAYS OF ACQUIRING THE CERTIFICATE	
Senior secondary vocational education features two learning pathways: the school-based pathway (bol) and the training on the job pathway (bbl). In the school-based pathway, the majority of the course consists of theory at school. The extent of the practical component (vocational practice) is between 20% and 60%. In the training on the job pathway, the extent of vocational practice is at least 60% of the course. The participant works four days a week in a training company, and attends school for theory subjects just one day a week. In principle it is possible to follow both learning pathways, but which pathway is offered will depend on the individual educational institution.	
Average duration of the education/ training leading to the certificate	4 years (6400 study hours) (depending on previous education)
Entry requirements The certificate preparatory vocational secondary education (vmbo) advanced vocational programme, combined programme, or theoretical programme, or a comparable level.	

7. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Dutch senior secondary VET is based on qualification files, that each contain one or more qualifications. The information included in part 3 and 4 is derived directly from the qualification file determined by the Minister of Education, Culture and Science. Optional subjects are linked to the qualification. The optional subjects have a total size of 15% of the course duration. The optional subjects completed by the student are listed on the certificate.
