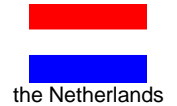

The most important duties of a Potter are:

Core task 1: Starts up and/or runs a freelance enterprise

- 1.2 Gives shape to the freelance company/sole proprietorship
- 1.3 Organises the financial part of (starting) the company
- 1.4 Monitors, registers and justifies the financial situation
- 1.5 Presents and promotes the company
- 1.6 Does purchasing for the company (products and/or services)
- 1.7 Acquires commissions/works at customer relations

Core task 2: Formalises products

- 2.1 Orientates about the assignment
- 2.2 Develops concepts
- 2.3 Develops concepts to proposals
- 2.4 Presents proposals and makes choices
- 2.5 Develops design

Core task 3: Manufactures ceramic products

- 3.1 Does preparatory work for the job
- 3.2 Prepares masses
- 3.3 Forms product
- 3.4 Makes moulds
- 3.5 Decorates the product
- 3.6 Regulates drying process
- 3.7 Mixes glazes together
- 3.8 Applies glazes

4. RANGE OF OCCUPATIONS ACCESSIBLE TO THE HOLDER OF THE CERTIFICATE

A Potter works in small companies which craft fine pottery. He manufactures single pieces, unique pieces of relatively small series of fine clay potteries. This can involve (functional) consumer goods or (artistic) autonomous work and possible mixed forms. The Potter works in a studio. He generally works as an independent contractor or freelancer, but he can also be employed as an independent professional. His clients consist of gallerists, architects, retailers or private clients.

<p>Access to next level of education/professions A Potter has several possible options in which to develop. Firstly, he can develop his trade from a creative perspective. A Potter can start up his own enterprise. If this enterprise is prosperous, it can grow and the Potter can hire staff. Aside from this, the Potter can receive further education. He can develop through art academy, fashion academy, or a higher professional Industrial formalisation education, in which he can develop in conceptual design and formalisation areas. Finally, a Potter can decide to take on extracurricular activities. Many Potters provide courses and training in their own studio. It is also possible to teach through guest lectures. Furthermore, a Potter can take part as a professional in various advisory commissions and partnerships.</p>	<p>International agreements The profession of Potter is not regulated in the Netherlands. However the education and training for this profession on qualification level 4 is regulated under the European directive 2005/36/EC, amended by directive 2013/55/EU. The regulated education and training gives access to regulated professions at the level of a diploma according to article 11 of this directive.</p>

6. OFFICIALLY RECOGNISED WAYS OF ACQUIRING THE CERTIFICATE

Senior secondary vocational education features two learning pathways: the school-based pathway (bol) and the training on the job pathway (bbl).

In the school-based pathway, the majority of the course consists of theory at school. The extent of the practical component (vocational practice) is between 20% and 60%. In the training on the job pathway, the extent of vocational practice is at least 60% of the course. The participant works four days a week in a training company, and attends school for theory subjects just one day a week.

In principle it is possible to follow both learning pathways, but which pathway is offered will depend on the individual educational institution.

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Entry requirements

The certificate preparatory vocational secondary education (vmbo) advanced vocational programme, combined programme, or theoretical programme, or a comparable level.

7. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Dutch senior secondary VET is based on qualification files, that each contain one or more qualifications. The information included in part 3 and 4 is derived directly from the qualification file determined by the Minister of Education, Culture and Science. Optional subjects are linked to the qualification. The optional subjects have a total size of 15% of the course duration. The optional subjects completed by the student are listed on the certificate.
